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
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

Cook Islands



- Northern Cook Islands experienced mostly near-normal to above-normal rainfall conditions the past 6-months, which was a much needed relief to alleviate water stress, brought on by the prolonged dry period for much of 2023.
- Southern Cooks experienced a significant meteorological drought the past 6months, drought committee was called for regular meetings and sit-reps. Cases of water cartage in Pa Enua.
- 9 known and recorded events occurred in 2024, 2 x Tropical Cyclone/Storm (TD10F & Low), 6 x Non-Tropical System(Swell) and 1 x event unsure of cause(generation mechanism).
- Historically, over 60% of tropical cyclones which affected Cook Islands occurred during El Niño years. With the current El Niño conditions, the tropical cyclone risk for Cook Islands for the upcoming tropical cyclone season 2023/2024 is high.
- It was expected that 2-3 named tropical cyclones (TCs) will pass in the Cook Islands exclusive economic zone during the 2023/2024 tropical cyclone season, from 1st November 2023 to 30th April 2024. The peak of tropical cyclone activity for Cook Islands is usually from December to February.
- 8 Systems within the South Pacific, 3 (2 named, 1 TD) entered the Cook Islands Exclusive Economic Zone(EEZ)
- TC Nat, relatively no sig impacts, tracked between the N. Cooks & S. Cooks
- TC Osai, system downgraded to a TD upon arrival into Cooks EEZ
- TD10F, did the most damage due to tracking close to Rarotonga






Samoa

• The 2024 Dry season was seen to experience normal rainfall with some extreme rainfall in the beginning. However, towards July and August, a significant dry spell occurred, worrying the nation of a potential drought to occur. Regardless of the dryness experienced, the nation was assured that it was a typical impact for the dry season. The outlook also issued together with the information sent out by the Ministry alluded that the dryness will ease in the next months, in which was evident in the observations seen recently.


PROLONGED DRY WEATHERLOW WATER LEVELS ALERT

- > Fix all leaks










Tokelau

Three year in comparison, there have been an extreme increase in strong wind warnings in Tokelau forecast. The month of August in three years period was used as an example (2022, 2023 and 2024). Data retrieved from Tokelau daily forecast provided by the Fiji Met Service. From 8 days in 2022 to 16 days in total in August 2024.

- Frequent strong wind warnings
- Sudden changes in weather. E.g sudden down pour and strong wind will occur in the midst of a sunny day that will only last for 2 to 5 minutes.
- Extreme heat.





Tonga

- Due to continuous heavy rainfall downpour in May 2024, cause excessive weed growth.
 Excessive weed growth can cause damage to crops and plants.
- Severe plant fungal disease usually happen especially to yams when rain is continuous
- Cancellation of domestic flights due to heavy rain and poor visibility in August 26th
- Dry conditions causes increase in local market price, yams and other root crops and vegetables during the period April to September



Tuvalu

- · Heavy rain with high winds affected plant trees, Vaiaku site
- Effects of heavy rain and strong winds associated to major impacts including, flooding, destroy plant trees (banana and coconut tree).
- Disrupt transportation, communication and buildings
- Funafuti SE swells 2 to 3 meters crash inshore at Kavatoetoe Site causing coastal inundation.
- It has impacted properties of building (Eg-TMS encloser).
- Inundated low-lying areas.
- Higher ocean temperatures and ocean heat waves leading to triggers of coral stress and bleaching.
- Increases the numbers of marine species are vulnerability in that particular areas (Tepuka near shore).
- For the past six months, Tuvalu has seen SSTs that approximately 30 degrees Celsius above normal, which has been linked to a hazardous coral reef surrounding the Funafuti Ocean. (reported from the fisheries department)

COOK ISLANDS

- Drought conditions for the Southern Cook Islands in which the drought committee was called into action, with continuous monitoring, sit-reps and meetings.
- Heavy swells causing coastal inundation, which in turn caused school closure and property damages to some hotels.
- 3 systems passed through EEZ, 2 named TC(Nat and Osai) and 1 TD(10F)

SAMOA

- Heavy rainfall in early 2024 causing flooding, fog and damages to land and roads.
- However, in the later part of 2024 saw prolonged dry spells(seen in July-August) causing fire outbreaks.

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TUVALU

- Heavy rainfall downpour causing flooding and strong winds affecting public transportation and property damages
- Inundation of coastal and low-lying areas from 2-3m SE Swells
- Prolonged high ocean temperatures and ocean heat waves leading to triggers of coral stress and bleaching, affecting marine species.






















The coastal inundation alert remains in force over the coastal areas of Rarotonga and the rest of the Southern Cook Islands.

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
